
This merit badge class begins with this class and will end **May 3rd**. All classes are needed to earn the badge.

Hike of the Month Horseshoe Lake

he his months camping spot is Horseshoe Reservoir located about 23 miles northeast of Carefree. Part of the Salt River Project system. Horseshoe Reservoir is the first lake on the Verde and is located above Bartlett Lake. You can camp under the shade of majestic mesquite trees at the first come first served campground. It's close enough to the Valley to have mild temperatures in January and offers a remote enough location for lots of fun. What will you do there? You can play capture the flag or perhaps fish. When the reservoir is refilling it offers good fishing (check fishing regulations!) Also, east of the reservoir you may see bald eagles perched in the trees. This month consider camping at Horseshoe!!

Chapter Meeting

The new Central District serves units from parts of the following three former districts: Camelback OF AMERICA (Oraibi Chapter), Thunderbird (Tovakinpi Chapter), and Lake Pleasant (Walpi Paho Chapter). Wipala Wiki Lodge is retaining the chapter boundaries based on the former districts through at least the end of 2018.

The Oraibi Chapter meets on the second Thursday of each month from August to May at 1316 East Cheery Lynn Road (LDS building), Pickup basketball starts at 6:00 pm, and the meeting starts at 7:00 pm. The Tovakinpi Chapter also meets on the second Thursday of the month. Due to the redistricting, its meeting venue is still being determined. Contact chapter adviser Jon Taylor for the most current information. The Walpi Paho Chapter meets on the fourth Thursday at 8155 West Thunderbird Road (New Life Community Church). Units with arrowmen should be sending their troop OA representatives to facilitate communication between the chapter, units, and the units' arrowmen.

Chapter Activities

Twelve members of Walpi Paho chapter will provide service and set up tepees at the Lake Pleasant Camporee. Some Walpi Paho ceremonialists are preparing for the May ordeals with the Hassayampa Chapter team. The Toyakinpi Chapter made and launched soda bottle rockets at last month's meeting and has a game planned for this month. The Oraibi Chapter practiced Cub Scout ceremonies at its March meeting. The team performed an Arrow of Light ceremony for P127, and the chapter conducted elections for T6 and T127.

Ceremony Team

Spring is an important time for ceremonies. Packs want Arrow of Light / crossover ceremonies, and troops need call-out ceremonies for newly-elected candidates. The lodge induction process (pre-ordeal, ordeal, brotherhood, and vigil) requires many ceremonialists and supporters to serve the candidates properly. Please contact your chapter adviser if you want to contribute to a productive ceremony team in your chapter.

Details for Arrow Tip 1 (Troop OA Elections) Plan for your unit election of OA candidates. There is still time for candidates to be called-out before the May ordeals. Order of the Arrow elections must be conducted by a team from the lodge (council) or chapter (district). A troop may not conduct its own OA election. Troops may schedule an Order of the Arrow election once per calendar year. This is the responsibility of the troop Order of the Arrow representative (OAR). an arrowman who should be appointed by the senior patrol leader. If the unit has no arrowmen or has not appointed an OAR then the SPL should schedule the election through the chapter adviser. Please provide at least three weeks' notice.

A candidate for the Order of the Arrow has one year from his election date to complete an Ordeal (thus becoming an Ordeal member). If he fails to attend an Ordeal in that time then he must be reelected (or renominated in the case of adults) for another opportunity to join. The lodge typically schedules inductions on the first and third weekends in May and the second weekends in September and October. Please schedule unit elections and call-outs accordingly.

Details for Arrow Tip 2 (Brotherhood)

Unlike ordeal and vigil eligibility which are determined by election or nomination, brotherhood membership is completely up to the discretion of each individual arrowman. After ten months or more of service following their ordeals, arrowmen can seal their membership in the Order by participating in the brotherhood ceremony. As they walk to the ceremony they look back on the example they have set and the things they have accomplished since their ordeals. They also look ahead to new ways that they can further the goals of the BSA and the Order. Completion of the ceremony signifies full membership, and the new brotherhood members receive sashes with bars embroidered above and below the arrow. Brotherhood members are expected to continue serving their units but also should consider expanded roles in the district / chapter, council / local lodge, or BSA / national lodge.

The lodge is offering a special brotherhood opportunity starting at 8:00 pm on Friday April 6th at the Heard Scout Pueblo. Registration begins at 7:00 pm. Normally the lodge conducts these ceremonies in the daylight, so this is a rare chance to enjoy the warmth and atmosphere of the campfire while advancing your understanding of the Order. If you can't make this one, brotherhood ceremonies will also be offered at the two May induction weekends on Saturday mornings.

Details for Arrow Tip Item 3 (Dues)

Lodge dues (\$10) are paid on a calendar year basis. Those inducted at 2017's September and October ordeals have their dues paid through 2018. Other members including those inducted at the May 2017 ordeals have their dues paid only through the end of 2017 and need to renew for 2018 (unless they paid ahead). Dues may be paid at the council service center, chapter meetings, lodge events, or the lodge website (wipalawiki.org). Dues must be current to attend any lodge or section event or to attain brotherhood or vigil honor.
