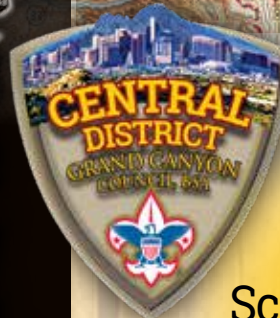

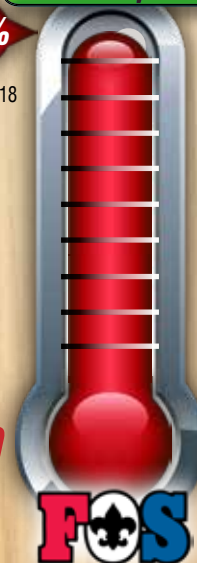

Hike of the Month Hackberry Spring

The Hackberry Spring is located off First Water Trailhead Superstition Wilderness. This would be a fall, winter, or spring hike – much too hot for summer! Excellent overnight hike for young scouts and/or beginner backpackers, could easily be a day hike as well. There is often water in Hackberry Spring (water must be treated). Some water collects in the rubble filled cement open tank at the bottom of the cliff. A metal pipe extends out from the tank over a dirt bank. Some cottonwood, willows, and mesquites provide nearby shade. Impacted campsites across the creek from the spring and more campsites a five minute walk down the creek bed. Our scout patrol did the following loop in April 2016. We parked at the horse trailer parking lot half mile (left side of the road) before reaching the First Water Trailhead parking area.



Leaving the horse parking lot (the lot is enclosed with waist high pipe) at the northeast corner we hiked on the unmarked trail in a north, northeast direction. The trail mainly follows a drainage and then goes up and over a pass, down into Hackberry Spring canyon. Other horse trails branch off in other directions, pick the trail that goes in a north, northeast direction (use a map-Goldfield topo or Superstition Wilderness

Tonto NF map). Less than 2 hour hike, about 2 miles from horse trailer parking lot to Hackberry Spring. We camped and then the next day continued on the well-defined horse trail up and over to Garden Valley (a very flat area covered with mesquite trees and chain fruit cholla cactus). Going south, south-east through Garden Valley the horse trail merges with the popular Second Water Trail. Go right on Second Water to the Dutchman's then right on the Dutchman's and back to First Water Trail – just one-half mile farther to the horse trailer parking lot.



Be sure to practice the seven "Leave No Trace" principles, www.lnt.org.

Rice & Beans

Let's do a backpacking recipe! This one uses three or four easy ingredients not including seasoning and is a great candidate for freezer bag cooking if you are looking to minimize dishes or, as my crews always did, want to avoid carrying a cooking pot. With just a lightweight stove and some freezer bags or oven liner bags, you are in business!

Ingredients

8 oz instant beans
6 oz instant rice
4 oz Fritos or tortilla chips
Cheese (optional)
Seasoning to taste

Instructions

1. Boil 1 Liter of water
2. Combine hot water with beans and rice
3. Let sit until beans and rice are rehydrated and tender (typically a few minutes), stirring (or kneading, if you are using bags) occasionally
4. Add crunchy bits and cheese and dig in!



The proportions above make about 4 servings at a healthy 668 calories per serving, weighing in at approximately 117 calories per ounce for you backpackers that love those stats (and don't we all).

My old crews packed a Jetboil stove that could boil a Liter of water in 60 seconds (oh yeah, we timed it), several 0.5 oz oven liner bags, and our personal mess gear as our only kitchen gear. With recipes like this we could go from stove ignition to eating in about five minutes, and nobody had to carry a pot.

Central District Kicks Off the IC5 & #GIVINGTUESDAY Programs

November 27th

Our plan is to spread the giving for Friends of Scouting (FOS) and the Arizona tax credit beyond the active Scout Group by using the BSA IC5 plan.

You have asked, "What is the IC5 plan?" Before I describe that plan, I want to tell you about the three different giving programs which will be implemented.

Program number one is the Arizona tax credit of \$400 for single or \$800 married.

Program number two is a \$229.20 gift to FOS. Each donor will receive the Friends of Scouting shoulder patch.

Program number three is an ask to join the 1910 Club with a monthly gift of \$19.10 from a credit card or debit card. Donors will each receive the Friends of Scouting patch and membership in the 1910 Club.

There are approximately 2,000 Scouters in the Central District. Thus, if all 51 units get one Scouter to participate in this IC5 program, and it works as provided in the above example, the amount of money that will be raised will be equal to the current lottery winnings. Being more realistic, if we can get 20%



To explain the IC5 program, I am going to set up an example by using actual numbers that your District Finance Chair will ask five of you to contribute. The goal for Central District is \$19,100.00. Here is what it will look like:

\$229.20 (1) District Finance Chair joins 1910 Club (monthly gift of \$19.10) and asks five others to join

\$1,146.00 (5) Scouters asked by Finance Chair to join 1910 club, and each agrees to obtain five others to join

\$5,730.00 (25) Twenty-five persons join 1910 club, and each agrees to obtain five others to join

\$28,650.00 (125) One-Hundred Twenty-five persons join the 1910 club, and each agrees to obtain five others to join

\$35,755.20 Goal was \$19,100.00

of the units to follow the program, with just one adult asking five others who agree to ask five, and next five agree to ask five more, we will raise 10 times the amount I have set out above.

It is anticipated that you will do most of these "asks" by phone, and no paperwork is required. You simply need to ask the donor to text GCCTUESDAY to 71777. The text will take the donor to a screen that will lead him or her through giving to both the FOS and the Arizona tax credit.

Rechartering

The goal for Central District is to have all of our Units turn in their Recharter packets in November. Preferably at the November 1st Round Table with the fall back being November 15. Your Commissioner is your assistant in Charter preparation so hopefully you have heard from them and are well on your way.

Along with your packet and print out with all of the signatures, don't forget your YPT Certificates

for all registered adults (remember we all had to take the new version before recharter), your JTE scorecard, your verification of your FOS donation (Fernando has all this information which you can access at turn in), your Unit sustainability form. If you need assistance and haven't gotten answers to the questions that you have, please contact me and if I don't know the answer I will find someone who does.

This is one area where Central District can shine and get an accurate membership headcount. We are so close to making our membership goal and are hoping that all of our Units are growing and contributing to that success.
