enture Scouts can bring friends to sample one of the many high adventure activities possible in Venturing, receive orientation to Venturing, and sign up into a Venture Crew as a new member. The optional activities at the Heard Pueblo include overnight camping, Introductory

SCUBA instruction, Rifle and Pistol Shooting, Rappelling, COPE course activities, and an interfaith worship service.



Each participant will need to pay \$26 and will select the events to include in their Big Event Schedules, then download the

appropriate parental consent forms. Signed consent are required, and forms will be collected at the registration check in, and at each adventure activity location.

A Big Event Schedule for an individual participant can include camping over

Friday night at the Heard Pueblo with their Venture Crew and a potential Venture recruit, cooking a breakfast meal Saturday morning,

Then the Venture Scout can buy lunch at the taco stand and take a guest to the recruiting station for information

about membership the values of Scouting.

After dinner cooked in camp by the Crew, the Venture Scout will enjoy an evening around the campfire, wake up Sunday

morning and attend an Interfaith
Worship Service before breaking camp.

Venture Crews can make the Big Event a half-day Saturday experience by checking in at 7AM, attending Rappelling at 8AM, Scuba at 10AM, and finishing up with lunch and the recruiting station at Noon. Crews and individuals should plan together to structure their Big Event experience to suit their needs. Each sample adventure experience will include information about how to contact consultants and include the adventure activities into the Crew's annual plan. A Crew that wants to consider a SCUBA trip can begin to learn how, or a Crew that wants to do team-building and leadership can conduct additional advanced COPE experience into the annual plan.



Meet Your New District Chair


eff still remembers the April night in 2nd Grade when his Dad took him down to the local elementary school to sign up for Cub Scouts. The following week he got his first uniform. He remembers

den meetings, fishing in the draw with canned corn as bait at Day Camp, burning an egg into the mess kit pan at a Camporee inter-troop competition, feeling like his fingers were frozen on a troop snow camp, and practicing the bugle in the car along with hundreds of other memories on the Scouting path as a young man. He is a second-generation Eagle Scout and treasures the learning and experiences provided by mentors, teachers, advisors, and counselors along the way.

Jeff married into a Scouting family (Becky's Grandpa 'Bob' Jarman wouldn't have given permission if Jeff wasn't an Eagle Scout) and begin his adult Scouter service in 2003 as an Assistant Scoutmaster for Troop 47. Since then he has served as Den Leader, Cubmaster, Merit Badge Counselor, and as a committee member at the Unit and District levels. Fourteen years later, including the privilege of attending Philmont Leadership Training twice with his family, he feels he is "beginning to catch the vision of Scouting" and the role it can play in shaping the lives of young men.

Scouts in White Sashes




ave you encountered a Scout or Scouter wearing a white sash with a red arrow on it? Have you noticed other sashes that have more than just the arrow? Have you wondered what these sashes and symbols mean?

The wearers are members of the Order of the Arrow, the BSA's national honor society. The purpose of the Order of the Arrow is fourfold as defined below:

- Recognize those who best exemplify the Scout Oath and Law in their daily lives and through that recognition cause others to conduct themselves in a way that warrants similar recognition.
- Promote camping, responsible outdoor adventure, and environmental stewardship as essential components of every Scout's experience, in the unit, year-round, and in summer camp.
- Develop leaders with the willingness, character, spirit, and ability to advance the activities of their units, our brotherhood, Scouting, and ultimately our nation.
- Crystallize the Scout habit of helpfulness into a life purpose of leadership in cheerful service to others.

Youth members of troops or teams may be selected as candidates for membership in the Order by their fellow youth unit members. Most adult candidates are nominated by their troop or team committees following a successful youth-candidate election. Other adults serving in district or council positions may be nominated as candidates by those respective committees. Adult candidates may be male or female. Youth candidates are always



male since they come from the all-male membership of troops and teams. All future references to candidates and members in this article will be masculine.


Each candidate is typically recognized during a public Call-out ceremony at a BSA gathering such as summer camp, camporee, roundtable, or a unit meeting / activity. To become an Arrowman, the candidate must undergo an "Ordeal" which uses symbolic challenges to strengthen the virtues of brotherhood, cheerfulness, service, and leadership. The ordeal is administered by the lodge which is chartered by the BSA to the local council. Wipala Wiki Lodge serves the Grand Canyon Council. Most lodges are further divided into chapters which support smaller geographic areas of the council. The Oraibi Chapter serves the Camelback District.

The Ordeal begins with a pre-Ordeal ceremony which sets the expectations of the candidate and introduces him to the Native American symbolism used throughout the induction process. Over the next

approximately twenty hours the candidate has opportunities to reflect on his Scouting career and to develop a better understanding of his place in Scouting and his future potential. Following this time of develop a better understanding of his place in Scouting and his future potential. Following this time of reflection, the candidate participates in an Ordeal ceremony where he receives a white sash embroidered with a red arrow. The new Arrowman has now achieved Ordeal membership, but this is not the end but just another step in his journey.

The Order of the Arrow is unusual among organizations requiring nomination because primarily non-members bestow the opportunity to join. A new Ordeal member must return to his unit (or district / council position if applicable) and render service to those who saw his potential and nominated him for his candidacy. He should recall the lessons learned in his Ordeal as he encounters adversity and seeks to overcome it. An Arrowman's primary responsibility is to his unit, and this is especially true for an Ordeal member. In the case of a youth

member who grows complacent toward Scouting as he grows older, this expectation can be used as leverage by youth and adult leaders in the unit to keep the Arrowman active and engaged.



Those who render exceptional service to the lodge, the Order of the Arrow, the BSA, or the council camp(s) may be nominated for the Vigil Honor. This nomination can again come from a non-member of the Order or from any Arrowman (not necessarily a Vigil member) following at least two years of Brotherhood membership by the nominee. The lodge scores all nominations and is able to select a number of Vigil candidates up to roughly two percent of the lodge's membership each year.



At least half of the Vigil nominations selected must be youth (defined as less than twenty-one years

old). A Vigil candidate again undergoes a time of reflection preceded and concluded by meaningful ceremonies. The new Vigil member receives a sash with an embroidered triangle (the symbol of leadership in the Lenni Lenape tribe upon which the Order's traditions are based) added to the elements from the Brotherhood sash.

Next time you see a Scout or Scouter in a white sash (or wearing other insignia identifying him as an Arrowman) you will know that he is among the best in the BSA. If your troop or team isn't benefiting from the Order of the Arrow program then consider contacting the chapter to learn more or to schedule an election. In your unit, encourage candidates to attend an Ordeal and Ordeal members to continue their journeys, further their understanding. and attain Brotherhood membership when they are ready. Nominate deserving, eligible Brotherhood members for the Vigil Honor. Expect all Arrowmen to provide cheerful service, promote outdoor experiences, and lead the way toward a better BSA.
